Start the 2008/2009 ski and snowboarding season off right – join a ski club, and really enjoy the winter!



Skiing hut to hut in the Rockies

>> Pure backcountry bliss

There is a way to ski Aspen and Vail in peak season without experiencing lift lines and crowds: traveling the backcountry from hut to hut. Carving pristine alpine bowls by day and arriving at a different cozy mountain hut each evening. you may soon forget why you ever bothered with a conventional resort vacation. While weekenders dodge each other on overrun slopes and pay dearly for a ski pass, you'll glide along remote wooded trails to a gorgeous overlook for a picnic in solitude. And you won't see a single SUV when you wake to a mountaintop sunrise and literally ski out your front door.

avalanche survival

The foreboding whump of an oncoming avalanche means that it's time to think – and act – quickly. While the best way to survive an avalanche is to avoid it, their unpredictable nature means that even the most prepared adventurer might encounter one of these icy torrents of destruction. The first thing to do when you hear the thundering rumble and find yourself in the avalanche's path is to yell to your group and get out of the way.

If you do get caught in the rushing snow, free yourself from your pack and ski poles and make swimming motions to stay near the surface. When the snow begins to settle, you'll have about three crucial seconds before the once-loose snow packs as hard as cement. During those three seconds you need to be extremely aggressive: create an air pocket in front of your face by making a shield with your forearms and punching the snow, take a deep breath to create chest space for future breathing, and if you are close enough to the surface, stick out an arm or a leg at the last second for rescuers to see. These measures will help rescuers find you and give you room to breathe until they do. The use of rescue equipment such as avalanche beacons, cords, and probes will enhance your chances of survival. Since proper training and preparation are the best ways to avoid getting caught in an avalanche, consider taking an avalanche safety

What you'll see from your front door is a bird's eye view of Colorado's Rocky Mountains, the largest collection of 14,000-foot peaks in the United States and home to some of the world's greatest backcountry ski slopes. The thirty or so huts that span the Rockies can serve as stepping stones for an extended ski tour or as a base for several days of in-and-out day-trips. Either way you'll be perfectly positioned to enjoy spectacular mountain scenery and still have the convenience and comfort of a place to call your own at the end of each day. Just don't expect room service and high thread count sheets – each hut is essentially a rustic wooden cabin equipped with padded bunks, wood stoves for heat, propane stoves for cooking, cooking and eating utensils and a large pot for melting snow. After your first day you wouldn't want it any other way.

Between three and nine miles of high bowls, gentle slopes, and wooded glades separate each hut, and you can expect a daily elevation change between 600 and 3000ft as you travel between them. The routes often follow existing trails and snow-covered forest service roads, though you may occasionally encounter sections that demand more ability, such as steep slopes and mountainous traverses, and from time to time you may need to break new trail. Most of your trip will be below the 11,400-foot treeline on routes that wind through silent, snow-covered forests of aspen, fir, and Engelmann spruce. When you ski out of the forests at higher elevations you'll be treated to dazzling one hundred-mile views of distant peaks.









Blue diamonds, and in wilderness areas, blazes notched into the trees mark the route. In either case, you could go a mile or more without any markings, so route-finding skills will be essential. Carry a compass and a detailed topographic map and know how to use them. A GPS can also be a helpful tool, but only if you have proven proficiency in its use, along with solid backcountry navigation experience. Your skills can be put to the test in a winter snowstorm where the trail can be obliterated, trail markings obscured, and some huts can be completely buried with snow. If your group is unfamiliar with the area or lacks the necessary skills, consider enlisting the services of a local guide.

While route-finding can be challenging, avalanches pose the greatest risk to backcountry skiers, and the Colorado backcountry is known for widespread and long-lasting snow-pack instability. Though the routes are positioned to avoid areas with the greatest avalanche risk, the risk can never be eliminated entirely. Skiers are often the trigger for a slide that can injure or kill them, so entering the backcountry with a current avalanche report, avalanche training and the proper equipment is essential. Learn to identify avalanche-prone terrain such as open slopes between 30 and 45 degrees, areas which show signs of previous avalanches, and cornices. Avoid these areas entirely or cross them quickly, one person at a time.

need to know

The 10th Mountain Division Hut Association (†) 970/925-5775, (*) www.huts.org) manages the system of backcountry huts. The huts experience highest demand in winter where peak season reservations are allocated on a lottery basis.

guides and gear Most skiers opt for a good metal edge backcountry ski with skins, but you also see Telemark, Alpine touring skis, and snowboards. If you are not already a skilled backcountry skier, you might consider traversing the terrain on snowshoes but you'll find travel to be slower. While most experienced backcountry skiers travel independently, novices should consider going with a guide. Paragon Guides (970/926-5299, 877/926-5299, www. paragonguides.com) offers guided backcountry ski tours in winter and summer hut-to-hut hiking. Avalanche beacons, probe poles, and shovels are now standard equipment for backcountry skiers and can be rented or purchased prior to your departure.

When to go December through April is best for skiers, but huts are open July through September and mid-November through April.

Gotting thoro Fly to Denver and rent a car or take shuttle service to trailhead areas two to four hours away. Shuttle operators such as Dee Hive Transportation (⊕888/266-2339) can take you to one trailhead and pick you up days later at another trailhead.


Chicago Week 2008 — Breckenridge


Take a Chance on Chicago Week – 2009 in Tahoe

From Saturday, March 21-Saturday, March 28, 2009, ten CMSC clubs are going to Lake Tahoe (Nevada AND California), with its beautiful scenery, varied skiing, fabulous nightlife and gambling casinos.

Free Event: Preview to Alpine Skiing

So, you are looking through this magazine not knowing the first thing about alpine skiing (downhill skiing). 

Snowmakers: An Import from Israel

A new snowmaking machine goes in to operation this fall at Zermatt, Switzerland, and Pitztal, Austria. So what, you say? Get this: The machine can churn out at temperatures up to 90 Fahrenheit. How's that for industry impact worldwide in light of global warming, rising snowlines and receding glaciers?

Both resorts will be making snow immediately as Zermatt offers skiing and boarding in its "Glacier Paradise" on Europe's highest ski runs year-round, while Pitztal's glacier ski area is open from September to spring, with the highest slopes in Austria.

The snowmakers are the inadvertent by-product of an industrial process a thousand miles away from the Alps. IDE (www.ide-tech.com), the company that makes them, is based in Israel and was founded to develop new desalination technologies.





Tyrol Basin, a Southern Wisconsin favorite among beginners and veteran skiers, is celebrating its 20th anniversary since reopening in 1989. Special discounts and anniversary events are planned throughout the upcoming season.

Located five miles north of Mount Horeb, Tyrol offers 16 tree-lined slopes that extend over 40 acres on the 300-foot vertical hill. Three triple chairlifts, two rope tows and a handle tow provide skiers with easy access to the slopes.

First-time skiers and snowboarders can learn to ski or board any day or night with a variety of lesson programs. Intermediates and veterans can explore the variety of steep and scenic terrain.

The renovations temporarily closed the Summit Mountain slopes during the 2007-2008 season. Summit Mountain's 12 slopes will be open this winter with several upgrades to the mountain taking place, including terrain upgrades and equipment upgrades. The Summit Mountain's most popular slope, Greenway, was widened and expanded for the season's opening. Summit Mountain will also have more snow this winter with all-new snowmaking equipment. At the nearby Schuss Mountain, the halfpipe was moved and enlarged, increasing the overall length and width of the pipe. The tubing park was moved to the backside of Schuss Mountain and enlarged with more and longer lanes. Located on 4,500 acres, Shanty Creek offers 49 downhill skiing slopes on two mountains and 21 kilometers of Nordic ski trails, seven miles of maintained mountain bike and nature trails, and snowboarding and tubing parks. Barry Bolich, general manger of Indianhead, said, "We are extremely excited about the opportunity to operate these resorts as a single business. We already have the best snow, and together we would have the best terrain and the most runs, and the ability to offer all of this in a seamless one-ticket package."

Indianhead Mountain is an "upsidedown" ski resort with its village and facilities located at the top of the mountain. "Our guests love the fact that they do not have to wait in line or ride a lift to take the first run of the day," Bolich said. "They usually pause to take in the view and then head down the mountain."

The resort's Sky Bar and Grille takes full advantage of the 35-mile panoramic view with large windows and a deck looking out over the Ottawa National Forest. Guests can also take in the view from many of the lodging units.

Killington Resort


Vermont's Killington Resort is the largest ski and snow-board resort in Eastern North America and celebrates its 50th birthday this December. Serving as many as 17,000 skiers a day, the resort has 150 trails and 25 lifts across seven mountain peaks. The main peak, Killington Peak, is the second highest in Vermont at 4,241 feet and has the second greatest vertical drop (3,050 feet) in the East.

With an average annual snowfall of 250 inches and a skiable area of 1,215 acres, the resort has become a central destination for skiers. Killington's 70 miles of diverse terrain offer skiers and riders of all ability levels a choice of wide-open courses, narrow New England runs, moguls, steeps and 13 tree skiing areas. Terrain parks at Bear Mountain provide freeskiers and riders opportunities for jibbing and jumping, including The Stash and a 430-footlong, Olympic-size Superpipe with 22-foot walls.

The resort has continuously grown over the years and will expand even more with a series of improvements costing \$8.4 million. Such upgrades include the new Skye Peak Express, ski trails, efficiency upgrades to the world's most extensive snowmaking system and expanded environmental programs.

Skye Peak Express replaces Skye Peak Quad, reducing ride time from 14 minutes to less than five, allowing more access to Bear Mountain and cruising trails such as Skyeburt, Cruise Control and Needle's Eye. One of only four in the world, The Stash is an all-natural terrain park with 34 features, including tree jibs, road jumps and log slides. The new Magic Carpet replaces the F-10 Poma lift, providing first-time skiers with a more pleasant uphill experience. Trails will be reconfigured, ensuring uninterrupted skiing and riding. Improvements to the snowmaking system increase efficiency and production while taking steps to reduce carbon dioxide emissions and become increasingly environmentally friendly.

There also are numerous off-mountain activities in which visitors can engage, including dog sledding, cross country skiing, sleigh rides, snowshoeing, snowmobiling and ice skating. Summer options include an 18-hole championship golf course, Kona Mountain Bike Park with more than 45 miles of trails and Pico Mountain Adventure Center with alpine slides, climbing walls and miniature



golf. Offering more than 100 restaurants and bars and shopping options, Killington is one of the top resorts in the Northeast for entertainment and skiing.

While Snowshed, Rams Head and Sunrise Mountain are mainly for beginners, Skye Peak and Snowdon Mountain provide a variety of terrain and trails that are suitable for a wide range of abilities. Bear Mountain has a very steep double black diamond mogul run, Devil's Fiddle, and a superpipe. Killington Peak has numerous double black diamond trails in addition to a few easier connecting trails. Pico Mountain is located on a separate mountain away from the rest of the resort, but work is being done to connect the mountain to the resort with lifts and trails.

There are approximately 120 inns, lodges and condos at Killington. Killington Peak's summit has an indoor restaurant, while the Peak Restaurant is serviced by a gondola lift, allowing non-skiers to dine with the added cost of a ride fee.

New York

Lake Placid, the site of the 1932 and 1980 Winter Olympics, offers several attractions that recall the glory of the Games held in the Adirondacks. The Olympic Center, with four operating rinks for skating and hockey, has the 1932 and 1980 Winter Olympic Museum. One arena is named for Olympic coach Herb Brooks, who led the unheralded 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey team to its miraculous defeat of the Soviet Union and ultimately a gold medal. Also at the center, a virtual reality experience simulates a bobsled ride from the driver's point of view, alpine skiing, ice hockey as the goalie and ski jumping from a 12-meter tower.

The actual tower can be seen during a visit to the Olympic Jumping Complex, where an observation deck accessible by elevator or chairlift affords a sky-high perspective on the art of the ski jump. You might see the nation's finest take to the air during Nordic jumping competitions throughout the summer and winter.



The Olympic Sports Complex at Mt. Van Hoevenberg, a winter sports haven, offers tours, bobsled rides and a chance to test your marksmanship skills with .22 rifles. Contact: orda.org.

Vermont

Okemo Mountain Resort is creating an array of innovations. New trails add eight acres to the resort. One of the new trails measures 2,600 feet and has a vertical drop of 850 feet. Located approximately half way between Innsbruck and St. Anton, high in the mountains of the Ötztal Valley, the longest side valley off the main Inn Valley, you will find Sölden. Highly favored by the Europeans, but largely unknown by Americans, Sölden is Austria's largest developed area of glacier skiing.

With reliable snow cover, two glaciers, three peaks above 10,000 feet and 60% snowmaking, good skiing is guaranteed. It is a big resort with a vertical drop of over 6,000 feet. You'll find an extensive network of slopes for the adventuresome intermediate, plus numerous slopes for the beginner and expert (not the same slopes). Also, we intend to ski one day at the neighboring ski resort of Obergural/Hochgural just up the valley.

There are numerous mountain huts for lunches and breaks for morning coffee and afternoon tea, all in magnificent settings.

For the non-skier, or those who wish to take some days off from skiing for sightseeing, Innsbruck is a short transfer and train ride away. Options for these side trips include a visit to the old mountaineering village of Vent or hot thermal spa at Langenfeld.

Sölden is also famous for its après ski parties and nightlife. However, this is just one of the many reasons to go on CMSC's European Trip this year. Here are a few more reasons:




